ENTITY OVERVIEW

Founded in 1974, UACJ Automotive Whitehall Industries (UWH) specialises in precision extruded Aluminium components and assemblies for the automotive industry. With headquarters in Ludington, Michigan, and additional plants in Paducah, Kentucky; Flagstaff, Arizona; and San Miguel de Allende, Guanajuato, Mexico, UWH serves a diverse range of customers across North America.

The 'Entity' comprises the Mexico site and two sites in Ludington, including Ludington (Progress Dr.) and Ludington (Sixth St.).

The Mexico Facility commenced operations in 2011, underwent an expansion in 2020 and currently has 358 employees on site, of whom 228 are women. The Mexico site's primary products include sunroof tracks, convertible top components, and structural components, with its primary activities including CNC Machining, Bending, Welding, Fabrication, Assembly and CMM analysis. In 2024, it shipped approximately 9,000 tonnes of products to the North American and European markets.

The Ludington (Sixth St.) site commenced operations in 2001, and the Ludington (Progress Dr.) site commenced operations in 2017. Across these two sites, are produced approximately 24,278 tonnes (Fiscal 2024) of Aluminium products, including sunroof tracks, structural components, luggage rack components, convertible top components and other automotive components, with its primary activities including Extrusion, CNC Machining, Bending, Welding, Fabrication, Assembly, CMM analysis and Engineering/Design. Together, approximately 440 people are employed, including 119 women.
